RedLine Executive Director to join Community Arts Stabilization Trust, deepening focus on Denver's need for affordable space for arts and culture

CAST expands its work in Colorado to create more sustainability for artists and cultural organizations

DENVER, CO – July 24, 2025 - After 15 years of advancing affordability in the arts sector as Executive Director of <u>RedLine Contemporary Art Center</u> (RedLine), Louise Martorano today joins <u>Community Arts Stabilization Trust</u> (CAST) as Managing Director in Colorado. Robin Alli Gallite is assuming the role of Interim Executive Director at RedLine, alongside Jane Burke, who will serve as Chief Curator & Regranting Director.

In 2019, Martorano spearheaded the launch of RedLine's <u>Satellite Studios Program</u> in response to the ever-growing need for affordable studio space and housing for artists, as well as accessible space for arts and culture in Denver. The Satellite Program has grown to nine locations, and Louise will continue to grow the program under CAST.

"I have always felt that I did not and do not want to live in a community that does not provide affordable spaces for artists and arts and culture—the individuals and entities that reflect the soul of our communities—so the inventory of accessible and affordable spaces for artists and organizations needs to be addressed," said Louise Martorano. "I've dedicated my work at RedLine to addressing this crisis, and partnering with CAST will allow us to take bold steps toward real solutions, rooted in local relationships and long-term strategy."





CAST's work bridges public and private sectors, prioritizing deep community engagement alongside collaboration with municipal agencies. Thanks to a longstanding partnership between the City and County of Denver's <u>Denver Arts & Venues</u> (DAV) and RedLine, CAST's Colorado office will be located at the agency's 1245 Champa Street building in downtown Denver. "We are so looking forward to this collaboration to support our arts and cultural sector. This is the convergence of creativity, trust and relationship building, and need, and I could not think of better partners," said DAV Deputy Executive Director Tariana Navas-Nieves.

Why Denver, Why Now?

Even as the <u>office vacancy rate nears 37%</u> in downtown Denver, many artists and organizations struggle to find affordable space. The opportunity to connect the dots between vacant space and creative use is attracting bold investments from funders who are interested in shaping the future of the city and surrounding region.

<u>Bonfils-Stanton Foundation</u> has stepped in to support this responsive work with a seed grant of \$600,000 over three years. Gary Steuer, President and CEO of Bonfils-Stanton Foundation, first introduced the foundation to CAST in 2018.

"CAST brings together Louise's vision and deep roots in the Denver arts ecosystem, our foundation's commitment to equitable access to cultural space, and the city's strategy to







revitalize downtown through the arts," said Gary Steuer, President & CEO of Bonfils-Stanton Foundation. "This partnership is a milestone moment in Denver's cultural history, and we're honored to help lead the way."

Growing a Global Community of Practice

Over the last decade, CAST has grown from a response to artist displacement during the first dot-com crash of the Bay Area into a proven model for ensuring artists and cultural workers can stay anchored where they create. Since its founding in 2013, it has become a global thought leader in cultural space stabilization, directly inspiring new entities like London's Creative Land Trust, Vancouver's Cultural Land Trust, and Seattle's Cultural Space Agency. CAST was recently highlighted as one of the first innovators in this field at the most recent <u>Creative Land Trust Summit</u> hosted in San Francisco this past May.

Extending CAST's capacity to Denver is a natural evolution, given the shared experiences of Denver and the San Francisco Bay Area and the ongoing displacement of artists and cultural workers from the communities they call home.

"What Louise has accomplished with RedLine is extraordinary. She is a generous and resourceful strategist who has earned the trust of the Denver arts community in an arts town," said CAST CEO Ken Ikeda. "We are thrilled to welcome her to CAST and eager to learn from her leadership. Louise will allow us to formalize CAST's work outside the Bay Area and we are so excited the City of Denver is our first partner in this work, bringing our expertise to other regions and participating in a growing, global community focused on art and cultural spaces."

New Partnerships Grounded in Collaboration

RedLine's Satellite Studios Program is providing the on-ramp for CAST's expansion to Denver, and represents the potential to build a more permanent ecosystem of support. Since launching in 2019, RedLine introduced 25 affordable live/work residencies for artists, enabled four galleries to open new commercial spaces, created 74 affordable studio spaces between Denver and Trinidad, and helped establish one multi-artist-owned property. Martorano is currently providing technical support to multiple organizations as they explore property acquisitions to enhance their operational stability. As part of her leadership transition, the existing satellite locations that RedLine has set up with support of RedLine's Board of Directors over the past eight years will transition to CAST under Martorano's care.







"I am so grateful to RedLine's Board of Directors and staff for embracing this opportunity and recognizing how CAST's capacity and expertise can support our Satellite locations and the work that is in motion for cultural space stabilization and studio space in downtown, the River North Arts District, Englewood, Trinidad and the Western Slope. It's partnerships like these—with cities, funders, and local leaders—that will help make policy and financing systems work for culture, rather than against it, and in turn, hopefully inform and secure new models to share for arts and culture stabilization locally and nationally," said Martorano.
